Arizona's Economy and Higher Education


- 1. Educational attainment is strongly correlated with a state's economic wellbeing.
- 2. In the future, the most in-demand jobs will require education beyond a high school diploma.
- 3. Those with higher levels of education are less likely to be unemployed.
- 4. There is a strong correlation between education level and personal income, productivity, civic participation, life expectancy, employment status and the strength of a community.
